- 4. What does this line mean? "He wouldn't know how to sink in the 'boot', A tender honour picked-up off the battlefields of assimilation".
- 5. What perspective of Australia does Watson present in his poem?
- 6. What attitudes/values/beliefs about Australia are revealed?
